The history of Missouri is deeply rooted in the cultures and traditions of its first inhabitants, the Osage, Missouri, and Quapaw tribes. These indigenous groups lived harmoniously with the land long before European settlers set foot in the region. The arrival of Europeans marked a new chapter in Missouri's history, with the first settlers, primarily French Canadians, arriving around 1750. They established a settlement known as Ste. Genevieve, which over time, became a thriving agricultural center. The fertile soils of the region provided ideal conditions for farming and livestock rearing, leading to an abundance of produce that needed markets. The Mississippi River played a crucial role in this aspect, serving as a vital conduit for trade. The river allowed for the efficient transport of goods, thereby fostering economic growth and transforming Ste. Genevieve into a buzzing hub of commerce and activity.
